LYST 293: Adolescent Literature in London, 3 s.h.

When J.K. Rowling made "Little Whinging" home to Harry Potter, she brought renewed attention to literature written for young readers, especially works written and set in England. LYST 293: Adolescent Literature in London meets in London for 10 days and features day trips to literary, cultural, and historical sites such as Bath and Oxford. LYST 293 gives pre- and in-service teachers the opportunity to study adolescent literature from the UK within the contexts in which it was written and/or set. Participants walk where the characters walked, see what they saw, and learn the principles of bringing fiction and non-fiction literature to life for the students they teach. Readings are selected from contemporary, classical and historical literature written by authors living in England, Scotland, Northern Ireland, and Wales. The course includes three two-hour, on-campus meetings.

This graduate study abroad experience is designed to provide pre- and in-service middle and high school literacy, language arts, English, and interested social studies teachers the opportunity to deepen their knowledge of British literature, culture, and history in order to enhance their teaching of these subjects, as well as to provide them with the kind of firsthand expertise and enthusiasm that will distinguish them from their professional peers and benefit the students they teach.

The course features excursions to Westminster, the Tower of London, the National Library, the National Museum, a Thames river boat tour, a private tour of Charles Dickens' London home, a group dinner at a historic pub, a war walk around St. Paul's Cathedral, and a performance at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, as well as an exploration of modern London. The group also makes day trips to England's most memorable literary destinations: Bath, Oxford, Canterbury and Dover.



LYST 293: Adolescent Literature in London is appropriate for education majors and professionals, and is an appropriate literacy course for students in the masters' programs in secondary education social studies or English. It may be substituted, under advisement, for other required or elective literacy courses.
