Faculty News

Dr. Craig Dalton, Assistant Professor of Geography, enjoyed a very productive summer and start to the Fall

semester. In July he gave an invited lecture with co-author Dr. Jim Thatcher at the University of Manchester in the United Kingdom. The talk, titled "Drifting with Data: **Experimental Workshop on Contesting** Networked Urbanism," was part of a series of events on "Playful Learning," organized by the Playful Mapping Collective.



Dr. Dalton also recently published the following: with coauthor Tim Stallmann, a new peer-reviewed journal article, "Counter-Mapping Data Science" in the summer edition of the Canadian Geographer, and with co-author Dr. Jim Thatcher, a chapter titled "Data provenance and possibility: thoughts towards a provenance schema for urban data" in the new book Data and the City edited by Rob Kitchin, Tracey P. Lauriault, and Gavin McArdle, from Routledge.

In October, Dr. Dalton co-organized and moderated a panel on maps, geographic data, and ethics at the North American Cartographic Information Society (NACIS) meeting in Montreal, QC. Immediately after the NACIS meeting, he copresented a paper at a workshop hosted by Renee Sieber at McGill University on current challenges and issues in Critical GIS. This subfield of Geography focuses on the roles of power, justice, and alternative future possibilities for geotechnologies, maps, and GIS.

Dr. Zilkia Janer, Professor of Global Studies and Geography, recently delivered the Keynote address, opening Latino Heritage Month at SUNY Fredonia. She spoke about her book, "Latino Food and Culture", which highlights the intersection of Latin American food, culture, and history in the United States as a result of immigrants and refugees.

Dr. Veronica Lippencott, Adjunct Associate Professor of Global Studies and her husband Dave traveled to her home country of Kenya in June. It had been 7 years since Veronica's last visit and it was Dave's first visit. They traveled to many parts of the country visiting relatives and friends. In accordance to Luo tradition, Dave paid a symbolic bride price in the form of two cows to Veronica's parents. Afterwards, Veronica's parents hosted a dinner with a few uncles, aunts, and cousins, introducing Dave to the family. He also made financial payments to the family members afterwards.

It was a wonderful event (see the photo of the cows!). Dr. Lippencott is also engaging in new research exploring alternative nightlife spaces among young adults in Nairobi, which are mobile and subversive.



Dr. Linda Longmire, Professor of Global Studies and **Dr. Tim Smith**, Adjunct Professor of Global Studies, attended the Global Studies Association meeting in June, 2017 at the University of California at Berkeley, CA. They also spent two weeks in Ireland, both North and South in July where the topic of the day was the consequences of Brexit for Ireland. In September, both officiated at the wedding in Costa Rica of David Kortava, a 2008 Hofstra graduate and former European Odyssey participant who now works at the New Yorker magazine.

Dr. Ying Qiu, Adjunct Assistant Professor of Global Studies and Geography, and Director of the Hofstra Asia Center, traveled to China over the summer, where she was able to visit educational organizations and meet with students interested



in applying to Hofstra! She shared lots of information about the many opportunities Hofstra has to offer, and even got to meet with some Hofstra alumni while she was there.

Dr. Jean-Paul Rodrigue, Professor of Global Studies

and Geography, is currently on sabbatical in Lyon, France where he is conducting research in logistics. The latest edition of his co-authored textbook, *The Geography of Transport Systems* (Routledge) has just been published and he continues to be in high demand for media interviews and for conference speaking engagements.



Dr. Grant Saff, Professor of Geography (and Chair of the Department) had a productive summer that included teaching summer classes and conducting his ongoing research on the

use of public space in the Ravel neighborhood of Barcelona. Besides traveling in Spain, he also visited Krakow, Poland where he spent time exploring Nowa Huta, one of the largest planned Socialist neighborhoods ever built. In November, he has been invited to give a talk titled "Sticking to the plan? Evaluating the merits of pragmatism for urban planning and economic development" in the Geography department at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona.

Our Geography Honors Society, Mu Kappa, Receives Prestigious Honors Chapter Award for Third Year in a Row

Congratulations to the student and faculty members of Mu Kappa – the Hofstra University chapter of Gamma Theta Upsilon (GTU), the international geographic honor society – for earning the Honors Chapter Award for 2016/2017! This is the third consecutive year that Mu Kappa earned this award. Dr. Michael Longan, President of GTU, wrote the



following in his letter to Mu Kappa: "As you know the criteria for Honors Chapter include campus service and a commitment to recognize outstanding student scholarship in geography. Just 3 of GTU's 130+ active chapters achieved the status of *Honors Chapter* in 2016/17."

The Mu Kappa chapter was initiated at Hofstra University in the spring of 2012 by Professor Kari Jensen. Since then, 96 Hofstra students and faculty have been inducted into the chapter. Together with Get Global's diversity dinners, Mu Kappa's ceremonies and events have contributed to expanding student worldviews and increasing the recognition and enhancement of diversity on our campus. Mu Kappa's recent award represents just one of many ways that our Geography program has received increasing recognition from the broader geographic community the last few years. Several of our students have presented papers and posters at both the regional and national annual meetings of the American Association of Geographers, including students representing our region at the World Geobowl competition held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting.



In May, Sarah Gerwens, Global Studies major (class of 2017) received the Undergraduate Library Research Award for her Global Studies Honors thesis completed under the supervision of Professor Zilkia Janer. The title of the honors thesis was, "Anglicisms - Nein Danke? Quantitative and **Qualitative Analysis of the** Occurrence and Usage of English Loanwords in Contemporary German" Sarah's thesis is third from our



Department to win this prestigious Award, following in the footsteps of Alex Moore (2010) and Etana Jacobi (2012).

Dr. Jennifer Cohen invited as a speaker by the Department

Dr. Jennifer Cohen, Assistant Professor, Department of Global and Intercultural Studies, at Miami University has been invited to give a presentation to our students and the Hofstra community titled, "I'm sorry that I'm crying": Stress, Dependency, and "Occupational" Health: Insight from black women nurses in Johannesburg, South Africa."

Using nurses' own words, Dr. Cohen examines stress and anxiety among nurses working in a public hospital in Johannesburg, South Africa. She demonstrates how gender and race norms at home create conditions of insecurity that contribute to burnout at work. The visit is co-sponsored by Economics,




ers. In addition, there will be opportunities for networking, learning about available careers and jobs, and numerous workshops and training sessions.
