Diarist

Sarah E. Firth Simonson was born c.1852 on Long Island, NY, where she resided with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Firth, along with three sisters, Henrietta, Libbie, Alice, and a brother, Edgar. On October 14, 1874, she married Charles M. Simonson; they had two sons, Alfred and Herbert. Simonson and her husband worked on a farm that was located about where the entrance to NY Tech is currently, opposite Valentine Lane, and perhaps a bit to the west.

The bulk of the collection is comprised of Simonson's diaries, which were written over a period of 44 years and were based on life events. Also included are newspaper articles, personal items, and ephemera.

Sarah and her husband, Charlie, worked on a farm. They harvested items such as chickens, hens, eggs, berries, cherries, milk, potatoes, wheat, corn, lettuce, lima beans, currants, turnips, cabbage, and apples. Charlie would often go to the city to sell these items. He would also travel to Glen Cove, Sea Cliff, Westbury, and Hicksville to sell products.

Funeral of E. Harper Firth Impressive Ceremonies at the Hempstead Presbyterian Church

East Williston, Jan. 21 – The funeral of the late County Engineer of Nassau County, Edgar Harper Firth, took place from the Presbyterian Church, Hempstead, Saturday afternoon, and in spite of the severely cold weather, was largely attended, many people driving a long distance to pay their last respects to the deceased.

Preceding the service at the church was a short prayer service at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Firth, the parents of the deceased, which was attended by the members and relatives of the family.

Escape in Crossing Crash Man and Woman Unhurt When Train Smashes Wagon Carrying Them

Mineola, L.I., Sept. 26 – While crossing the Long Island Railroad on the Roslyn Road, a station wagon, in which was Miss Henrietta Firth of Glenhead and Herbert Simonson, was struck by a Mineola Fair special train.

Mr. Simonson was driving and Miss Firth sat in the back seat. The country is open at this point, with the railroad tracks stretching straight away in either direction.

The horse got over the track in safety. The two occupants were thrown out, the wagon wrecked, and the rose ran away. Mr. Simonson and Miss Firth were taken to the Nassau Hospital, where it was found they were only shaken up.
