Note: This 42 semester hour Comparative Literature Major is designed to enable the student to acquire a broad background not only in the literary history of different cultures and countries, but also in their relation to one another, and their relative degrees of influence on crosscultural movements, themes and genres in literature and the arts. Students in this major must complete three courses in a first foreign language beyond level 4, and an additional two courses in a second foreign language beyond level 2. In addition, students must complete five courses in comparative literature or literature in translation (including French literature in translation, Italian literature in translation, and Spanish literature in translation), either in the distribution curriculum or other. One of these courses must be in a non-Western literature, or in the cross-cultural category of the distribution curriculum; also, one of these courses is to be an independent study on a special topic in comparative literature, or an honors essay, if eligible, to be done usually in the student's last year or semester by arrangement with a professor in the department. Students must take an additional 12 semester hours, as follows: Complete two additional courses in one literature and complete two courses in any one of the following disciplines: anthropology, art history, drama, history, music, philosophy, or sociology, or another discipline by arrangement. Students in Comparative Literature are encouraged to study abroad; advanced placement in more advanced levels of language courses will also expedite progress through the major. In addition, many literature courses that count for the major are taught on campus or DL during summer terms and in January.
