
Kalikow School Poll at Hofstra University Executive Summary and Analysis



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
Executive Summary

The suburbs, again, appear poised to be the deciding voice in choosing the next president of the United States. Approximately one year away from the election the first Kalikow Poll offers several insights into how Americans — and especially suburbanites — view the performance of Donald Trump and the state of the Democratic primary. The Kalikow Poll also gathered information on how likely voters in the 2020 election view the state of America's political institutions, numerous issues that occupy the forefront of the policy debates, and the security of the electoral process. Finally, the Kalikow Poll offers a glimpse at what likely voters think about the ongoing impeachment inquiry that will likely shape the 2020 elections.

Trump's Performance and the State of the 2020 Race


President Trump's record one year before the election is mixed in the eyes of likely voters. In our sample, 63 percent of likely voters — including independents — are dissatisfied with the direction of the country — though 65.7 percent of Republicans are satisfied with the country's current course. Similarly, Trump has a 48.7 percent job approval rating overall and has a favorability rating of 48.5 percent. As is often the case, independents cleave closely to the average, with Democrats strongly disapproving (94.4 percent) and Republicans strongly approving (89.6 percent) of his job performance. Republicans support his nomination for a second term at 86.7 percent, though many disagree with the recent cancellation of primaries and caucuses (43.1 percent).

Comparatively speaking, Trump's favorability ratings match those of other elected officials and political figures. Indeed, Trump, Biden, Pelosi, Warren, and Sanders have favorability ratings in the 40s. Only Barack Obama and Mike Pence enjoy a positive favorability rating. Mitch McConnell, by contrast, has a favorability rating of 35, about 7.4 percentage points lower than his counterpart in the House of Representatives (Pelosi has a favorability of 42.4 percent)




On most issues, Trump has a negative overall rating. Healthcare is the issue for which voters affix the lowest rating (-5.2 percentage point net approval). He also receives net negative ratings


of -3 or more for race relations (-3.0 percentage point net approval) and foreign affairs (-3.1 percentage point net approval). The economy and crime, by contrast, is an issue for which the president receives a net positive approval rating (5.8 and 0.4 percentage point net approval, respectively).



Regarding whom Trump might face as a 2020 Democratic challenger, Democrats as of late October have coalesced around three top candidates at the national level: Joe Biden (27.5 percent), Elizabeth Warren (26.6 percent), and Bernie Sanders (12.3 percent). The remaining candidates have single digit support. In the suburbs, Democrats are split between Joe Biden and Elizabeth Warren, with both receiving 27.5 percent support.



The Kalikow Poll results indicate that one year out from Election Day Joe Biden is the strongest candidate to defeat Trump in both the aggregate and the suburbs. Overall, Biden has a three percent advantage over Trump — a result within the margin of error. In the suburbs, the advantage is 6.6 points for Biden.



■ Trump ■ Biden



When Trump's opponent is Elizabeth Warren, Trump fares better, and the race is a toss-up at 50 percent for each. In the suburbs, her advantage is 0.4 percentage points.





Against Bernie Sanders, Sanders has a 2.4 percentage point advantage overall. In the suburbs, Sanders has an advantage of 3 percentage points. Both numbers are within the margin of error. While Sanders appears to outperform Warren slightly, Biden remains the candidate who appears to poll best against Trump in a head-to-head matchup and boasts an advantage in the suburbs that exceeds the margin of error.

We also asked a potential late entrant into the Democratic primary: Michael Bloomberg. The results of a head-to-head matchup question indicates that Donald Trump has a 2.9 percentage point advantage over Bloomberg, though Democrats would strongly support him if her were the nominee. While Bloomberg has significant support from urban voters, Trump performs better in the suburbs and rural parts of the country.






Confidence in American Institutions and Agencies

The Kalikow Poll also assessed American's confidence in many political institutions and agencies. In general, likely voters still have confidence in their institutions. Only confidence in the federal government drops below 40 percent confidence. As is consistent with previous polls, the U.S. Armed Forces rates the highest, with 88.7 percent confidence.

Over the past few years, however, certain institutions have been in the center of highly political and often partisan skirmishes on the national level. Those partisan clashes seem to have caused partisans to view some institutions differently. Indeed, the FBI enjoys a higher rating among Democrats when compared to others (presumably this is the case because of James Comey and the Mueller investigation). Support for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is strikingly different: Republicans overwhelmingly have confidence in the agency, while Democrats have even less confidence in ICE than they do the federal government. The U.S. intelligence community also shows a partisan difference, where Democrats have the most confidence. The differences in confidence of the U.S. intelligence community may change even more as the impeachment process continues.

Institutions with Partisan Differences

Election Security, The Mueller Report, and Impeachment

Election security, in general, is a concern for likely voters (63.9 percent indicate concern). When broken down by party, however, Democrats are substantially more concerned when compared with both Republicans and Independents, where Republicans are the least concerned at 44.1 percent.


Likely voters appear to be paying close attention to both the Mueller Report and the impeachment proceedings. A strong majority of respondents report knowing at least something about the Mueller Report, with 40.5 percent reporting they know a great deal about it. When it comes to believing that the report exonerated the president or not, partisanship matters: an overwhelming majority of Republicans believe that it did exonerate the president (80.1 percent), while a similar percentage of Democrats believed that it did not (85.5 percent). Independents were nearly split down the middle on the question with a slim majority believing it exonerated the president (52.8). It is also worth noting that suburbanites are more likely to indicate that the Mueller Report did not exonerate the president (54.4 percent).

For impeachment, 80.1 percentage of likely voters correctly identified the fact that a whistleblower complaint was the impetus for the impeachment proceedings. As it stands, a


majority of respondents (52.3 percent) support the impeachment proceedings. Likewise, a plurality of respondents (49.4 percent) support the House of Representatives impeaching Donald Trump. In the suburbs, support for impeachment is 49.5 percent, a plurality. Interestingly, individuals who support impeachment also support the Senate convicting and removing Donald Trump at 91.3 percent. Overall, 45.3 percent of the sample believes Trump should be convicted and removed from office. How individuals feel about the process, of course, largely depends on their partisan attachment.

Issues


We asked respondents to report whether they thought certain issues would be important in informing their vote for the 2020 elections. While respondents reported that all issues will matter to some extent, the issues that stand out the most are the economy and healthcare.



Healthcare is again at the center of the domestic policy debate for both the 2020 primaries and presidential election. In general, most individuals are satisfied with their current healthcare covered — the notable exception, of course, are those individuals who do not currently have insurance. Suburbanites are less satisfied with their coverage than their urban counterparts, though they rate their current insurance a bit higher than individuals who live in rural areas. Support for either a "public option" or "Medicare-for-All" is relatively unpopular for most groups. Neither policy receives support from a majority of suburbanites. Urbanites do support both policies, while rural residents have the least amount of support for both. When we asked a follow-up question to assess whether individuals who support Medicare-for-All would still do so if it meant giving up their private insurance, 73.4 percent of employer-provided insurance holders still supported the policy.




Immigration also stands to be a significant issue during the 2020 elections. While immigration remains a highly partisan issue, individuals also view immigration differently depending on where they reside. Prioritizing border security over a path to citizenship is the modal response for suburbanites and rural residents. The modal response for urbanites is to prioritize both equally. Regarding the highly controversial use of detention centers, suburbanites are almost evenly split on whether they think it is inhumane and unnecessary or humane and necessary. Urbanites and rural respondents see the issue in opposite terms: urbanites see it as inhumane and unnecessary while rural individuals see it as both humane and necessary. Immigration, therefore, seems to have the potential to have disparate impacts on voters depending on both party preference and locale.



Gun control remains perhaps the most intractable issue at the national level. Both urban and suburban residents strongly support some kind of increased gun control (88.6 percent and 59.4 percent, respectively). Support for a ban on assault-style semi-automatic rifles also reaches a majority in suburban areas (59.9 percent) and 80.5 percent support in urban areas. Rural respondents, however, are split on the issue.


Views on one's personal financial situation also varies depending on location. Urbanites are more likely to report their personal finances are in excellent shape. Suburbanites, however, are the least likely to report their finances are in poor shape, while rural residents, overall, report the weakest personal finance status.



Homeownership is highest amongst rural respondents, with suburban respondents reporting homeownership at 65 percent. Urban respondents were the least likely to report owning their residence. Increasing the minimum wage enjoys broad support from all types of likely voters, including Republicans. Interestingly, there is broad acknowledgement that the government should play a role in reducing the income gap between the rich and poor. Indeed, only Republican respondents are less likely to agree with this concept.

We also asked respondents to share their thoughts on the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act's limits on how much taxpayers can deduct from their state and local taxes (SALT). A plurality of all respondents (38.4 percent) disagree with this limitation. A plurality of voters in all types of locations also disagree with it. Notably, however, 30 percent of respondents were not sure how

they felt about this limitation. This leads to two possible interpretations: 1) a substantial number of likely voters are not sure how to feel about this limitation, and/or 2) a significant percentage of likely voters are unaware that this limitation exists.



Suburbanites, as do most likely voters, support same-sex marriage. They also think race relations have gotten worse in the past few years and that climate change is either a serious or very serious problem. In their community, suburbanites are worried about crime, local schools, the status of infrastructure, and drug abuse.

Methodology

The Kalikow Poll, designed by Hofstra University's Peter S. Kalikow School of Government, Public Policy and International Affairs and executed by YouGov, is based on interviews of 1,608 of YouGov's panelists, matched down to a sample of 1,500 respondents based on propensity scores. Additional details on YouGov's weighting methodology is appended to this summary. The poll recorded responses from individuals who are 18 years or older and are likely voters in the 2020 election. The survey collected responses from October 25 – 31, 2019. The survey oversampled respondents who live in suburban areas of the country. The overall margin of error for the survey is 3. The margin of error for suburbanites is 3.6 (n=1,000), 6.8 for urban respondents (n=300), and 8 for rural respondents (n=200).

YouGov Sampling Methodology "

Sampling and Sample Matching "

Sample matching is a methodology for selection of representative samples from non-randomly selected pools of respondents. It is ideally suited for Web access panels, but could also be used for other types of surveys, such as phone surveys. Sample matching starts with an enumeration of the *target population*. For general population studies, the target population is all adults, and can be enumerated through the use of the decennial Census or a high quality survey, such as the American Community Survey. In other contexts, this is known as the *sampling frame*, though, unlike conventional sampling, the sample is *not* drawn from the frame. Traditional sampling, then, selects individuals from the sampling frame at random for participation in the study. This may not be feasible or economical as the contact information, especially email addresses, is not available for all individuals in the frame and refusals to participate increase the costs of sampling in this way.

Sample selection using the matching methodology is a two-stage process. First, a random sample is drawn from the target population. We call this sample the *target sample*. Details on how the target sample is drawn are provided below, but the essential idea is that this sample is a true probability sample and thus representative of the frame from which it was drawn.

Second, for each member of the target sample, we select one or more *matching* members from our pool of opt-in respondents. This is called the *matched sample*. Matching is accomplished using a large set of variables that are available in consumer and voter databases for both the target population and the opt-in panel.

The purpose of matching is to find an available respondent who is as similar as possible to the selected member of the target sample. The result is a sample of respondents who have the same measured characteristics as the target sample. Under certain conditions, described below, the matched sample will have similar properties to a true random sample. That is, the matched sample mimics the characteristics of the target sample. It is, as far as we can tell, "representative" of the target population (because it is similar to the target sample).

When choosing the matched sample, it is necessary to find the closest matching respondent in the panel of opt-ins to each member of the target sample. Various types of matching could be employed: exact matching, propensity score matching, and proximity matching. Exact matching is impossible if the set of characteristics used for matching is large and, even for a small set of characteristics, requires a very large panel (to find an exact match). Propensity score matching has the disadvantage of requiring estimation of the propensity score. Either a propensity score needs to be estimated for each individual study, so the procedure is automatic, or a single propensity score must be estimated for all studies. If large numbers of variables are used the estimated propensity scores can become unstable and lead to poor samples.



YouGov employs the proximity matching method. For each variable used for matching, we define a *distance function*, d(x,y), which describes how "close" the values x and y are on a particular attribute. The overall distance between a member of the target sample and a member of the panel is a weighted sum of the individual distance functions on each attribute. The weights can be adjusted for each study based upon which variables are thought to be important for that study, though, for the most part, we have not found the matching procedure to be sensitive to small adjustments of the weights. A large weight, on the other hand, forces the algorithm toward an exact match on that dimension.

Theoretical Background for Sample Matching

To understand better the sample matching methodology, it may be helpful to think of the target sample as a simple random sample (SRS) from the target population. The SRS yields unbiased estimates because the selection mechanism is unrelated to particular characteristics of the population. The efficiency of the SRS can be improved by using stratified sampling in place of simple random sampling. SRS is generally less efficient than stratified sampling because the size of population subgroups varies in the target sample.

Stratified random sampling partitions the population into a set of categories that are believed to be more homogeneous than the overall population, called *strata*. For example, we might divide the population into race, age, and gender categories. The cross-classification of these three attributes divides the overall population into a set of mutually exclusive and exhaustive groups or strata. Then an SRS is drawn from each category and the combined set of respondents constitutes a stratified sample. If the number of respondents selected in each strata is proportional to their frequency in the target population, then the sample is self-representing and requires no additional weighting.

The intuition behind sample matching is analogous to stratified sampling: if respondents who are similar on a large number of characteristics tend to be similar on other items for which we lack data, then substituting one for the other should have little impact upon the sample. This intuition can be made rigorous under certain assumptions.

Assumption 1: Ignorability. Panel participation is assumed to be *ignorable* with respect to the variables measured by survey conditional upon the variables used for matching. What this means is that if we examined panel participants and non-participants who have exactly the same values of the matching variables, then on average there would be no difference between how these sets of respondents answered the survey. This does *not* imply that panel participants and non-participants are identical, but only that the differences are captured by the variables used for matching. Since the set of data used for matching is quite extensive, this is, in most cases, a plausible assumption.



Assumption 2: Smoothness. The expected value of the survey items given the variables used for matching is a "smooth" function. Smoothness is a technical term meaning that the function is continuously differentiable with bounded first derivative. In practice, this means that that the expected value function doesn't have any kinks or jumps.

Assumption 3: Common Support. The variables used for matching need to have a distribution that covers the same range of values for panelists and non-panelists. More precisely, the probability distribution of the matching variables must be bounded away from zero for panelists on the range of values (known as the "support") taken by the non-panelists. In practice, this excludes attempts to match on variables for which there are no possible matches within the panel. For instance, it would be impossible to match on computer usage because there are no panelists without some experience using computers.

Under Assumptions 1-3, it can be shown that if the panel is sufficiently large, then the matched sample provides consistent estimates for survey measurements. The sampling variances will depend upon how close the matches are if the number of variables used for matching is large. In this study, over 150,000 respondents to YouGov's Internet surveys were used for the pool from which to construct the matches for the final sample.

Current Sampling Frame and Target Sample

YouGov has constructed a sampling frame of U.S. Citizens from the 2016 American Community Survey, including data on age, race, gender, education, marital status, number of children under 18, family income, employment status, citizenship, state, and metropolitan area. The frame was constructed by stratified sampling from the full 2016 ACS sample with selection within strata by weighted sampling with replacement (using the person weights on the public use file). Data on reported 2016 voter registration and turnout from the November 2016 Current Population Survey was matched to this frame using a weighted Euclidean distance metric. Data on religion, church attendance, born again or evangelical status, interest in politics, party identification and ideology were matched from the 2014 Pew U.S. Religious Landscape Survey. Characteristics of target samples vary based on the requirements of the projects. Typical general population target samples are selected by stratification by age, race, gender, education, and voter registration, and by simple random sampling within strata. At the matching stage, the final set of completed interviews are matched to the target frame, using a weighted Euclidean distances metric.



Weighting

The matched cases are weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame are combined and a logistic regression is estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function may include a number of variables, including age, years of education, gender, race/ethnicity, predicted voter registration, interest in politics, born again status, ideological self-placement and inability to place oneself on an ideological scale, and baseline party identification (i.e., the profiled party identification that was collected before the survey was conducted). The propensity scores are then grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles. The final weights may then be post-stratified by gender, race, education, and age. Large weights are trimmed and the final weights are normalized to equal sample size.
