The controversial issue of immigration is commonly presented in the media as a contentious battle between those in favor of reform and those calling for stricter laws against illegal migration. In this panel, we will avoid placing the issues into a simplistic dichotomy that too often results in dramatic "sound-bites," but very little substance. Instead, we will examine immigration through the prism of human rights in order to get a better picture of the human costs of our current immigration policies. We'll hear real stories of family separation, of economic dislocation, and of the violent backlash that characterizes the lives of undocumented workers on Long Island. How does militarizing immigration policy impact everyday people? What is the Dream Act and how is it a way for immigrant students to forge a path to citizenship? Through the process of sharing stories, we hope to shed a different light on why comprehensive immigration reform is urgently needed.
