Violence against Latina Immigrants: Inheriting, Reproducing and Challenging Inequalities

Immigrant women are particularly vulnerable to abuse: the intersection of their gender, sexuality, class, race, ethnicity, and immigration status stimulates nationalistic anxieties and multiplies the effects of both interpersonal and structural violence. Based on activist research at a nonprofit organization in Texas, Roberta Villalón uncovers how systemic inequalities not only permeate the current gender-based violence legislation, but also are reproduced by nonprofit workers. She addresses the various ways in which Latina immigrants try to seize the opportunity to put an end to abusive relationships while navigating a system filled with formal and informal barriers that prevent the most disadvantaged survivors from becoming autonomous citizens. Villalón ends by making some suggestions on how to dismantle such insidious barriers at the individual and institutional levels from the bottom-up.
