Learn; Focus; Then Go Do Something About It

This summer, for the first time in its history, the Center for Civic Engagement had the opportunity to welcome new students at each of the orientations.

The CCE is trying to increase its visibility and profile among the Hofstra community. With that in mind, Izzy [Goodman], intern for the CCE, and I began each of our Tuesday presentations with an introduction, followed by a video, and a short presentation about democracy and civic engagement. The presentation was to begin a simple and ongoing conversation about the fundamentals of American democracy, how they relate to civil rights, and how all that can be exercised through civic engagement.

We're trying a new mantra for civic engagement:- the three steps are [1] learn, [2] focus, and [3] act, if you remember. I think we should all feel comfortable participating in politics, whether it be voting, writing letters to representatives, or being a part of a political demonstration.

At the CCE event, students discussed the rights entitled to every American citizen in the First Amendment. We spoke of each of the five rights: freedom of speech, the press, religion, to petition the government with grievances, and to peacefully assemble. By a show of hands, it was the first time for many of the students had 'seen of what democracy looks like.'

On Thursday mornings, Izzy and I could be found in CV Starr Hall where all the new students were registering for classes. As one of the goals of the CCE is to increase democratic participation, a voter registration drive was open to the students every week. Izzy believes, "voting is something that shouldn't just be important to students who care about politics." She told the students at the registration table, "[Voting is] a right that is guaranteed to every American citizen and it's not something that should be taken for granted."

Throughout the summer, the CCE registered approximately 300 students. This semester, we'll be in the Student Center atrium every Tuesday and Wednesday until October holding a voter registration drive between IIa.m. and Ip.m.
