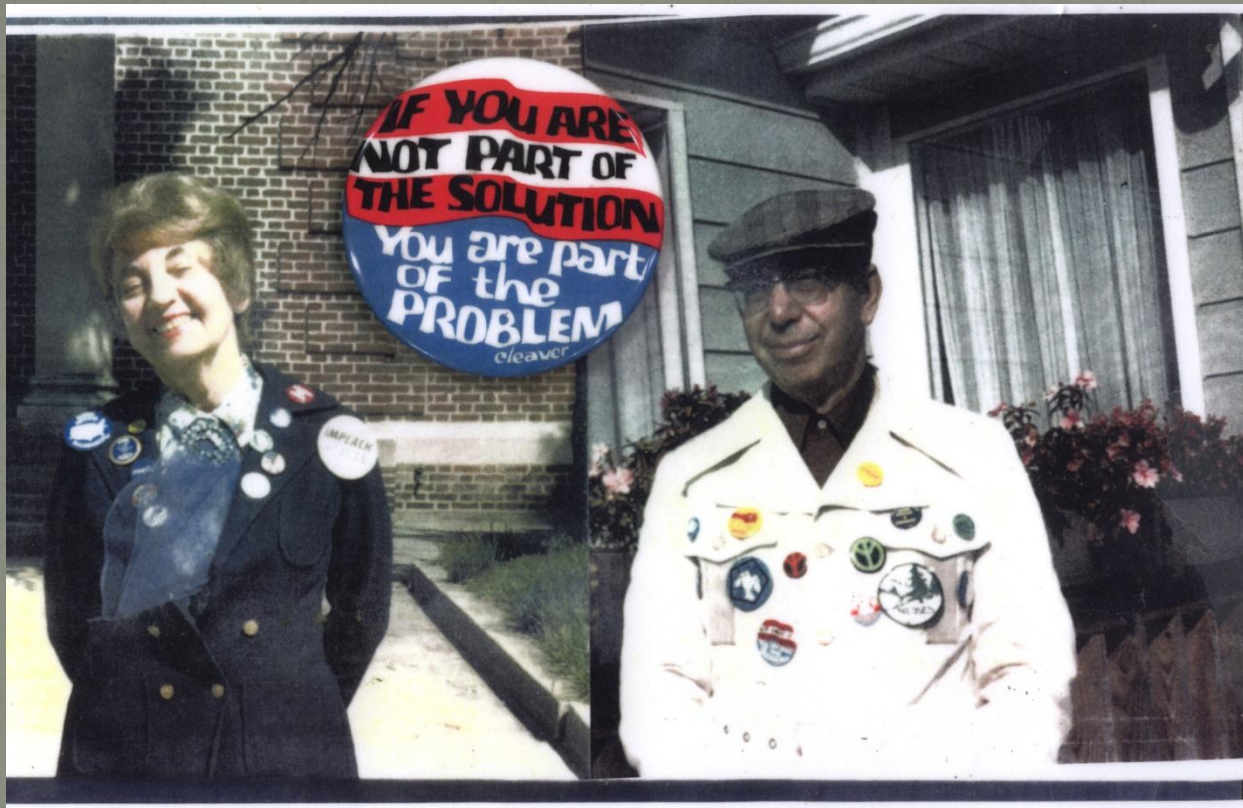


Davidson, Bernice and Rebeun, Collection, 1946-1994. 4.7 cubic ft.

Bernice and Reuben Davidson were a married couple from Oceanside, Long Island, who were actively involved in humanitarian and political activities from the 1960s to the 1990s. Their commitment to humanitarian and political activities began in 1967 during the Vietnam War and continued until the Gulf War in the 1990s. The Vietnam War had caused inflation in the United States that also created unemployment, homelessness, and price hikes on food. Witnessing the hardship of the people, Bernice sent letters to senators, congressmen, on the local and national levels, the media, and other organizations. In 1970 Bernice and Reuben went to Washington to lobby for the repeal of the draft.

The single purpose of the National Council to Repeal the Draft is to end conscription.

The NCRD welcomes the active support of all those who consider repealing the draft to be in the best interests of the national community.

The NCRD deplores the influence of the Selective Service System upon the structure of American society and the quality of American life. Military conscription is a form of involuntary servitude. It is a denial of liberty and occupational choice to the young. It subverts the finer impulses of men—duty, loyalty, responsibility—to the pursuit of the ever-increasing ruthlessness and horror of modern war.

Many groups and individuals call for reforms. But reform does nothing to remedy the basic evil of the draft. Sound as any given reform might be, the draft remains a basic day-by-day infringement of the rights of all American men between the ages of 18 and 35. NCRD calls not for reform, but for outright repeal.

Many alternatives to the draft have been proposed. They include the reduction of military commitments abroad, the use of civilians for supply and maintenance type jobs in the United States, a volunteer army with adequate pay and increased incentives. We however propose no specific alternative. The role of the NCRD is to persuade Americans to urge their elected representatives to repeal the entire Selective Service System.

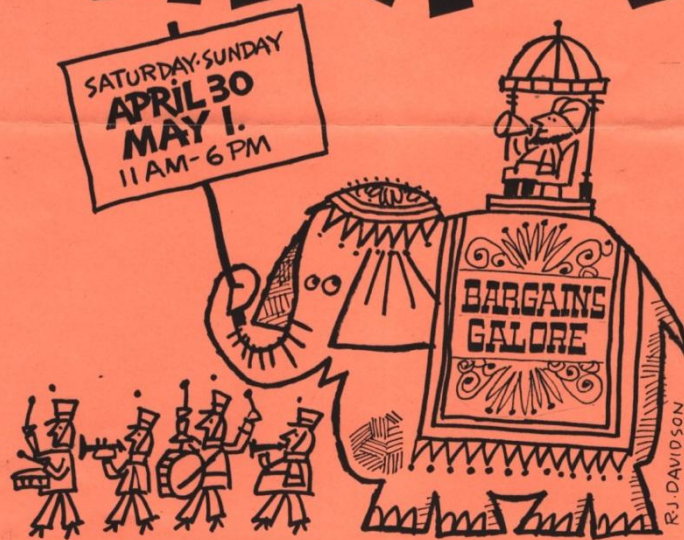

Recipe: Operation Food Price Rollback

§ There is no one recipe for a successful Operation Food Price Rollback. We already have the first ingredient — outrageous prices! The rest of the recipe is up to us.
§ Here are some suggestions that we found very useful, and we hope you will find helpful.

Leafletting was our first way of reaching people. Putting out a leaflet requires a stencil to type on and a mimeo machine to run it off. Stencils are sold at many stationary or office supply stores. Perhaps the salesman could tell you how to use it correctly. As for the mimeo machine, you could ask a community organization, school group or local church if you could use their mimeo machine and have somebody show you how it works.

If you are unable to do this, Women United for Action nearest you would be happy to mail you leaflets. You could have a stamp made up with a local address or phone number and stamp the leaflets so people can get in touch with you.

When the weather is warm enough, we've found opening a bridge table where we're leafletting has helped attract attention and provide a small meeting place for interested shoppers.

On the table we've made up "sign-up" sheets so that shoppers who want to work on the campaign are encouraged to leave their names and phone numbers. On some of our leaflets, we've printed a coupon on the bottom so that interested shoppers can mail in their names, addresses and phone numbers.

When the weather is cold, we've been thinking of ways to get our message across indoors. One way we thought of is to have a sticker campaign, sticking labels on many foods that read such things as "25 percent off," or "This Food is Spoiled." Home-made stickers can be easily made with stamps made with the slogan, and labels, as we have enclosed.

§ We're sure new ideas will keep coming up as our campaign gets rolling. We are anxious to hear your ideas. If you need more help in getting the campaign underway don't hesitate to call. Here is a listing of Operation Food Price Rollback chapters already in operation.

The papers have carried headline news when prices soared to record highs, yet when Women United for Action brought women from many different cities to protest against this in Washington, demanding that food prices be rolled back 25 percent, there was no mention of it.

W.U.A. has waged several struggles not only locally in neighborhood supermarkets but also has taken the issue of rising food prices directly to Washington.

In August, on the anniversary of the wage-price freeze, W.U.A. picketed outside the Price Commission which is supposed to keep food prices low. Yet since its operation, they've allowed food prices to go up as high as 12 percent. We then marched to the National Association of Food Chains (a trade association that lobbies in the interest of over 10,000 food chains). There we demanded a public meeting with 20 of the top executives of the largest food chains. Mr. Timothy McEnroe, spokesman for the N.A.F.C., agreed to the meeting once he saw that W.U.A. wouldn't back down.

"Flour Power"

With a shower of Pillsbury flour, two women from W.U.A., crowned Jackson Grayson, head of the Price Commission, "The Pillsbury Dough Boy." The ceremony took place as Grayson was about to address a meeting of Wall St. security analysts.

The women made the point that the Price Commission has done nothing to stop the skyrocketing cost of food. Just a month before this meeting, the commission granted Pillsbury an 11 percent price increase. So Grayson got a "taste" of the feelings of many women concerning this increase, among others.

Meanwhile, a picket line of Women United in front of the building drew the attention of many workers on their lunch hour, some of whom joined the line.

Why didn't you see this on tv?



The meeting was scheduled for Saturday, October 14 at a time when working women and mothers of young children could attend. However, two weeks before the meeting, the N.A.F.C. sent us a 4 page letter, refusing to meet with us. They said they didn't consider our demands "serious."

Well, on October 14 women from all over the country: Wilmington, Buffalo, Rochester, Chicago, Maryland, Detroit and many other cities, came to Washington to make our voices heard and to show that they must take our demand for a 25 percent rollback seriously.

About 125 members and friends of W.U.A. picketed outside the White House to demand that Nixon order a rollback on all food prices. The women then marched to a nearby supermarket where they chanted slogans such as "Milk Up, Meat Up, Bread Up, We're Fed Up." Many shoppers enthusiastically joined the line. W.U.A. stated that they would go back to their cities and unite more women in Operation Food Price Rollback so that we will win all our demands including a 25 percent rollback on all food prices.

Women Workers Force "Cut" In Price

Schrafft's cafeteria operates a hot table where I work. One morning, while several people came to the table for their usual 10 cent cup of coffee, we noticed a stack of large cups and a sign which read, "COFFEE — 15 cents." Everyone was furious. We discussed ways of fighting this increase, getting a petition together, or maybe having a boycott.

Then a group of women took the first step. We cut the inflated cup back to size with a pair of sewing scissors, and paid the manager a dime. Our actions won the support of our Teamster's local.

We drew up petitions and posters. We went to all the departments and got willing commitments from the sisters to be at the cafeteria at 10 a.m. the next day — with a pair of scissors and a dime. As one sister said, "If we don't stop them now, they'll raise all the prices."

Well, we stopped them! Schrafft's restored the price of coffee to 10 cents, and agreed to a meeting with the union committee that now has two sisters on it.

4. Fresh, high-quality food—no more rotten food on the shelves.
5. Honest food packaging, and food without harmful chemicals.
6. Sanitary conditions—no roaches or rats in the stores.
7. That stores stop mark-ups of prices on days when welfare recipients and people on social security receive their checks.
8. That stores don't sell non-union iceberg lettuce or any products boycotted by striking workers.



Why is it that nobody consults with shoppers about rising food prices? Nobody ever asks us what we would do to end inflation. Aren't we the experts? We don't have to have a degree in economics to know that we're spending more and more at the supermarkets and getting less — to see that our wages can't keep up with the rising cost of living.

In the last year the government passed laws that froze our wages, raised our taxes, cut welfare and slashed the budget for essential services such as education and medical care. Why don't they make cuts where they should be made — like in food prices? We know that the government can lower food prices, but instead is working hand in hand with the owners of food chains by setting up a Price Commission that rubber-stamps almost every increase.

Food prices can be rolled back if enough of us get together and fight for it. Many things that are often taken for granted today, such as social security, a minimum wage, the 8-hour day, and unemployment benefits were once unheard of. But today, because of the united struggles of people, millions enjoy these benefits. If the millions of shoppers were as organized and determined to win, as the handful of food chain owners are to cheat us — we would win our demands.

food price roll back

While the bands were playing and the floats flying, Women United, determined to raise the issue of rising food prices, passed through the crowds, and marched right in a block-long space between two floats. Along with our own float — a money eating turkey, we carried a street-wide banner reading, "High Food Prices Gobble Up Our Wages!" Shouts of support and encouragement spurred us on in our 12 block march.

Women United for Action Gets Formed

And that's why we decided to form an organization that could unite millions of women to fight for what we need. A group of us from many different backgrounds (but all shoppers) got together here in N.Y.C. and got in touch with friends and relatives in other cities to form Women United for Action. We began planning our first campaign — to roll back food prices 25 percent — that's how much they've gone up since 1967. We named it Operation Food Price Rollback.

Getting the Campaign Rolling

The first thing we realized we would need was literature. The enclosed leaflet entitled, "Sale — 25 Percent Off All Food Prices. If We Fight For It," was our very first effort to reach other women with our campaign.

We also thought it would be a good idea to have a nationwide petition drive, in which we demanded an end to many of the problems we face in the supermarkets.



Every Saturday and some weekdays, we went to supermarkets in our neighborhoods, setting up tables, leafletting, and getting into many conversations. The response was what we had hoped it would be. Just about every shopper shared our feelings about the rising prices and was glad to see that finally someone was doing something to fight against this daily robbery. Many shoppers living in poor neighborhoods where food prices are highest and food quality is lowest were particularly interested in our demands for equal pricing in all neighborhoods and high-quality food (see petition). Many women were anxious to help spread the word about our campaign. They offered to take leaflets to their friends and neighbors and helped get signatures on our petitions.

When we spoke to women who had started O.F.P.R. in other cities, we heard that Women United for Action was getting the same enthusiastic response in many areas of the country.

Through trying different approaches in many cities, we saw that there are many different ways to involve more women and build our strength. Here's what some women across the country were able to do with some imagination and plenty of spirit.



Houston

In Houston, Texas, women started their Operation Rollback by leafletting at a local supermarket. The manager became so nervous about their leafletting, that he immediately made several improvements in the store, including offering rainchecks to customers and properly labelling meat.

Women Offer Special

Another supermarket in Houston has a slogan saying, "Our most important day is the day our store becomes your store." So women organizing Operation Rollback made them EAT their words by taping a huge banner across the store front announcing: "Today is the day your store is our store! All prices rolled back 25 percent!" They went inside the store and marked "25 Percent Off" on as many items as they could. Excited shoppers crowded the checkout counters with food bought at 1967 prices!

"Load-In"

In Rochester, members of Women United for Action went inside a supermarket and started talking to the shoppers about the

outrageous prices and poor quality of the food. Within minutes they drew a large crowd of angry shoppers. Then they loaded one shopping cart with rotten food and called the manager out to confront him. Many shoppers joined in with complaints about the store. The manager refused to admit that his food was rotten, but no one was convinced. The following Saturday, the women returned to the supermarket with a spirited picket line outside the store.

"Where did all the executives go?"

In Chicago, women protested the skyrocketing food prices by picketing the national headquarters of A&P, located in the crowded downtown section of the city. The picket line drew much attention. Then the women entered the building to meet with a representative from A&P. The executives were so scared that they shut off the elevator service. But the women walked up five flights of stairs to get to their offices. When they got there, the businessmen were scurrying to other rooms — afraid to be seen, like the roaches in their stores. W.U.A. left a statement of their grievances and continued to picket outside.

"Decent Meat at Decent Prices"

W.U.A. in Buffalo went to a supermarket where they had been leafletting, and spread a banner across the meat counter reading, "Decent Meat at Decent Prices."



Many of these actions drew local publicity. (Enclosed are reprints of some of these articles.) In some cities, Women United for Action was invited to speak on local radio and tv shows. But, most important, we've been hearing from many women, such as you, throughout the country, excited about our campaign, interested in more material, and hoping to have an Operation Food Price Rollback in their neighborhood.

We hope to see an Operation Food Price Rollback in every city and every town so that not only will the food chains be forced to recognize us, but they'll have to give in to our demands.

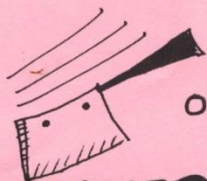





THE DRAFT INFRINGES UPON OUR FREEDOM. The draft extends the control of the state over the lives of its citizens. Through channeling it usurps the individual's opportunity to choose his own future and assigns that right to government officials. It interferes with the orderly planning and development of the lives of all young people.

THE DRAFT DIVIDES US. The draft conscripts many young men unable to vote, either because of age, or because, as in Puerto Rico, they are denied the franchise. It exploits the labor of all young men, especially the politically and economically least powerful. Today the draft has forced an estimated 15,000 young men into political exile and imprisonment, and unknown numbers into desertion.

THE DRAFT VIOLATES OUR VALUES. The draft departs from the American tradition which has always regarded conscription not as part of a normal way of life, but as an emergency measure. It undermines the ideal of voluntary service freely given to one's community, nation, or world. It violates religious liberty and freedom of conscience.

THE DRAFT MILITARIZES OUR NATION. The draft adds greatly to the already overwhelming influence of the military establishment in this country by giving it the power to conscript men into involuntary servitude. Under the guise of producing a citizen army, it simply augments our present professional army. Through military indoctrination and training in the use of weapons, conscription contributes substantially to the spread of violence in the United States today.

THE DRAFT DOESN'T WORK. The draft is an antiquated, inefficient, unfair, expensive, and unnecessary way to provide for national defense.

THE DRAFT HURTS US INTERNATIONALLY. The draft weakens democratic control over foreign policy. It provides the manpower for large scale military intervention overseas without approval by Congress and the people. An unlimited supply of conscripts encourages the government to resort to military solutions and thwarts the development of a constructive foreign policy.
