A. SGA Recognition Request

i. 180 Degrees Consulting

1. Three minutes to speak for why the organization is seeking SGA recognition

- a. Gaining SGA recognition will help this new club thrive and carry on after the current eboard moves on. This will help the club establish a legacy. SGA funds would also help the organization go to conferences and other events that would help the club grow. Its purpose is to help its members think of an organization and its social impact. Every meeting is a different workshop that concentrates on a part of the consulting process. The club currently has three teams that are working with a nonprofit organization in different aspects of the business organization. Consultants get to show their work at the end of the year in a cumulative presentation. The organization has a community outreach and OSLE recognizes them for their outreach.

 - i. Anyone is able to become a member. If you'd like to be a consultant, you need to fill out an application.

 - i. The organization appeals to Zarb students because of its pre-professional nature

 - i. Not this semester but they are trying to get the word out their that being a member is an option.
- e. What has changed since the last time you came for SGA recognition?
 - i. They are trying to push students to become members and that they do not need the application. Many students do not realize
- f. How are members who aren't qualified to be consultants able to contribute to the meetings?
 - i. They are able to interact with Joe Cohen, a professional consultant who comes to many meetings.

iv. What are some ways you plan to recruit new members?

1. Improve the marketing of the club; show students that this organization is a preprofessional organization that they can learn a lot from.

v. How are members able to aid to your purpose?

1. The free consulting services that the club provides to local organizations.

vi. Are your speaker events open to campus?

1. The speakers are during meetings, so they are just open to members.

vii. How many consultant applications did you receive?

1. About 25, and 18 accepted.

viii. Are the seven people who weren't chosen as consultants members?

1. We opened this option to them but no one chose to.

 - 1. There are not strict guidelines that would prevent students from gaining the position, but they are encouraged to provide a resume and prove that they will be committed.
 - iii. What was an event that you have put on?
 - 1. Teamed up with another campus organization and brought in Geico campus recruiters. They have also teamed up with other organizations during relay for life.
 - iv. Do you have specific organizations you would like to reach out to?
 - 1. Center for civic engagement because of their ability to reach out to the community.

- l. New Questions
 - i. Have you brainstormed other ideas for funding?
 - 1. Bake sales and other events collaborated within Zarb. They cannot fund much because they cannot be biased.

- ii. Why were there restrictions put on the amount of consultants on a team?
 - 1. 180 international gives us some guidelines on how to construct the teams and so we just cannot have teams much larger than we do now.
- iii. If you gain SGA recognition do you have any events you would like to go to or plan?
 - 1. There is a conference at the end of the year that members can take advantage of and network with professionals in their fields.
- iv. How does 180 international recognize membership?
 - 1. The international organization does not play much of a role into our organization and we were able to structure our chapter to the way Hofstra would like to see it. They are not restrictive in terms of membership and do not have guidelines that would restrict members.
- v. Who creates the applications for consultants and who looks over them?
 - 1. Our president and our vice president develop the questions and aboard meets to discuss those applications.
- vi. What is on the application?
 - 1. Class standing, GPA, leadership experiences, major, past experiences.
- vii. Can aboard be members or do they need to be consultants first?
 - 1. The current eboard have all been consultants but not for a restrictive purpose.

4. Debate

a. Speakers for

i. Speaker 1: I do not believe that this club is exclusive based on the precedence we have set. To name one, Danceworks requires auditions to take part in their shows. Hofstra running club requires a certain speed to race in their events.

ii. Speaker 2: They said that the people who were not chosen as consultants chose not to come back. This clubs purpose is to benefit its members and as they stand they put on a lot to help their members.

b. Speakers against

i. Speaker 1: There should be some attendance policy that lays out what happens to members who do not want to be full consultants. It seems that all they want is money for this conference and it worries me that the people who did not get the position has consultants did not return.

ii. Speaker 2: It seems that their club is coming to the "bank of Hofstra". It is up to the eboard to decide what happens to members and that should be clearly defined. Precedence has been made

because no members who were not chosen for the application process have returned.

c. Motion for a 5 minute unmoderated caucus, staying in our seats, to discuss whether this organization should receive recognition.

iii. Speakers

1. Current meetings are all brief. The international organization is exclusive and the only school with open membership is Brown University.
2. We should not consider how clubs run their meetings because that does not factor into other clubs recognition.
3. We are really hung up on the application process, but programming board is an application and we do not let everyone in.
4. Those 7 members who did not return were never told that they could return as members. They have never advertised that aspect of their organization.
5. We should not make this decision tonight because the organization needs help and we need to help them develop more as an organization.
6. Kristen has come to meetings all semester and they are trying to change their club. They are trying to change their organization and are trying to move in a new direction.
7. There was never any statement at their first meeting that people could become members and not consultants. If they gain recognition for their conference we will be funding exclusivity.

8. Not everyone in the organization is looking for recognition.
- d. Motion for a 4 minute moderated caucus, 4 speakers 1 minute speaking time each.
 - i. Speaker 1: there is difference between people being members and people taking part in the organization. They would do more to engage the people who did not become consultants if they wanted to fully be recognized.
 - ii. Speaker 2: They should not be approved tonight because they need help as an organization. All conferences require an application. We should not be attesting our personal opinions on the organizations that we are involved in so we do not become biased.
 - iii. Speaker 3: A lot of the organizations that require some type of application have guidelines for basic members to remain active. They should have more involvement for those members. There is no description for those members in their constitution. If you cannot consult for the organization are they really members?
 - iv. Speaker 4: This club needs help and needs SGA to mentor them. The president is against SGA recognition and the organization is currently involved with talks of gaining funding from the Zarb School.

B. Office Violation Legislation

- i. The Club relations would like to review the current policy that is in place so we all understand what has changed in the new legislation.
- ii. Changes in the legislation

1. "Regardless of the members age" because even if a member is 21 they are not allowed to have alcohol in the office due to university policy.
2. "J-Panel will be notified despite the level of offense" because j-panel is an appellate court and cannot intervene until an appeal is brought.
3. They included which section of the Guide to Pride lays out how and when they would have disciplinary action taken against them.
4. All offenses were taken out of our constitution and policy series.
5. Fines were not included because depending on the damaged property, plant would decide how much the damage costs.

campus. We just need to know what SGA's stance is before our event on Tuesday. We should at least hear about it.

- ii. Speaker 2: putting it on the agenda last week will be pointless because cabinet is after their meeting. This is club relation attempting to address student concerns.

2. Speakers against:

- a. Speaker 1: we did advertise for the event. We will set bad precedence that senate will add last minute items to the agenda infinitely.
- b. Speaker 2: Hypothetically this could lead to infinite budget appeals whenever clubs come with their concerns. This event has been planned for a long time and should have been brought to senate earlier. This is leading to inefficiency.

1. Motion has passed by a 1/3 vote

a. Debate

i. Speakers for:

- 1. Speaker 1: We should hear what Rita has to say and why we should consider it. We represent this campus and this is an important issue. Although this is unusual we should face it as it is here it now. They want a yes or no answer so if we come back with an answer other than that it will look horrible to other organizations.
- 2. Speaker 2: The overall mission of SGA is to improve SGA's relationship with students. This could really help this organization because it would help our image. This is an effort for cabinet not to be

exclusive. This just passed two days ago and we need to help.

ii. Speakers against

1. Speaker 1: By adding things to the agenda last minute we can extend senate until 2 3 or 4 in the morning. This should have been brought to the PR committee on the day it was decided.
2. Speaker 2: We can achieve the most optimal results if this were shown to us in advanced. It is easier to talk to senators individually to avoid the precedence issue. We should not suspend the rules of the way we operate.

vi. Presentation on the Petition

1. There is financial hardship placed on students to pay for the credits of internships as well as the travel to and from the city. If we are required to get an internships before graduation this should be provided for students in their tuition.

vii. Questions:

1. So the institute is asking for the University to pay for travel?
 - a. They want the money for credits to go towards transportation.
2. Does the petition say that PR students have to pay for internship credits?
 - a. No, just that it doesn't cover transportation.
3. What other methods has the institute thought of?
 - a. Not sure because this petition is for the university to speak of the issue.

viii. Debate:

1. Speakers For:

- a. Speaker 1: we are here to advocate for students and this initiative is great for SGA to support. It is expensive to go to and from the city and this would help the entire student body. We are paying to take the internships so the university should help us. In one day, the institute received over 500 signatures and that is incredible. If it is a requirement the university should help.
- b. Speaker 2: it is extremely expensive for students to go to and from the city for these internships. This debate is for the discussion of the issue.

2. Speakers Against:

- a. Speaker 1: We are about to pass unanimous support for this initiative. That is thousands of dollars and should not be set just for one major. This requirement was known when they came to this university and people have taken internships in the past did not receive any funding.
- b. Speaker 2: tuition should not be increased for people who did not plan for this in advanced. There is no way for us to monitor how students use this funding to get to and from the city and they can use it for social reasons. If we support then we are saying that the entire student body supports this.

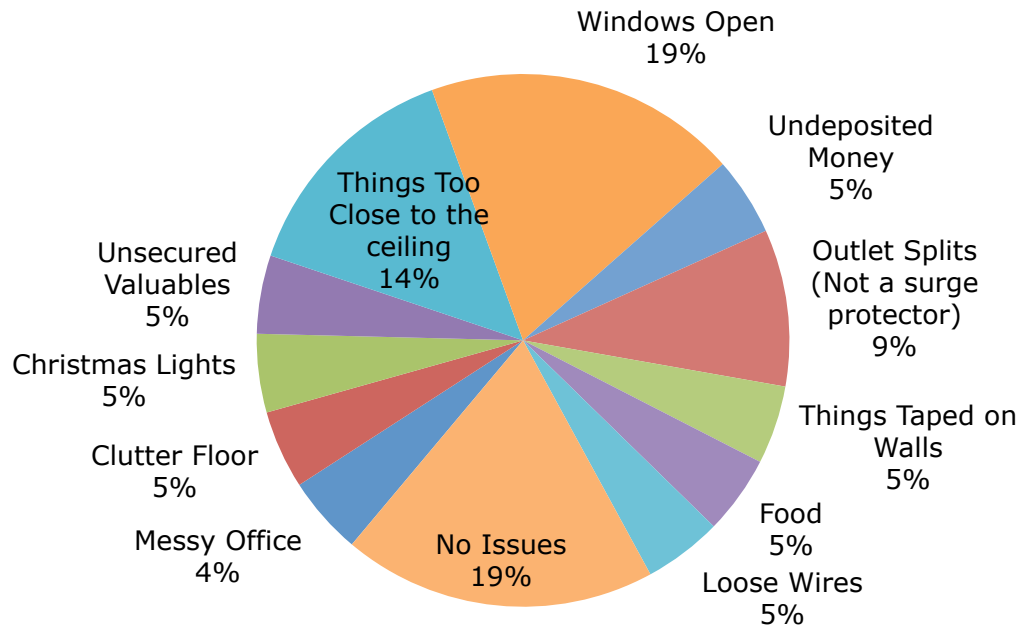
