
# **Conspiracy Theories Hofstra University/Fall 2022**

## **Course Description**

Conspiracies seem to be everywhere ... but are they? For some, they explain what is hidden in the world, and for others, they are a misguided interpretation of this same world. Discrimination, persecution, attacks against political systems, and even murders have followed these theories. This course will explore what is behind this phenomenon. We will explore the histories, politics, media, and social media discourses; possibilities, and problems behind conspiracy theories; and why some religious, racial, and gender collectives seem to be usual targets. Students will be able to understand not only how conspiracy theories came to be and changed through time, but also to discern between them and sound social critique.

## Assignments

1. Weekly Quotes 20%

You are to post on Blackboard one quote from the text or video we are reading/watching. You will post two quotes per week, one on Sunday (for Monday classes) and one on Tuesday (for Wed classes) at 9:00pm. The quote should be about something you want to discuss because called your attention, you feel strongly about it (in favor/against) or you need help to fully understand it. Quotes after 9pm and repeated quotes will receive no credit.

- Active Attendance and Class Participation 20% You are to participate actively in class through group and plenary discussions. You can be absent 1 class without penalization. Starting the second class the grade will suffer.
- Letter (1500 words -this is around 5-6 pages double-spaced-) 25% You are to write a letter to a challenging interlocutor explaining a key issue you learned in class. More information will be provided in class two weeks before the deadline.
- 4. <u>Final Project: Research Paper (2750 words this is around 8-9 pages double-spaced) or</u> <u>Alternative Project 35%</u> You are to write a research paper. Those students who have B+ or above in the midterm

and posted above 85% of the quotes may arrange an alternative project with the professor. More information will be provided right after the midterm.
